# **Plant Sale info**

Our bi-annual plant sales at our Spring and Autumn shows have gone from strength to strength and are now well-known for great bargains and even better plants.

All plants are locally grown, propagated, harvested and maintained by a devoted group of HSHS members. Led by Conall and Nuala of Ardán garden, they meet regularly to discuss and learn the practicalities of growing plants for the Sales. We have had master classes in the gardens of Janet and David Jeffrey, Brian and Jean Lynch, Karen and David Foley - Earlscliff and Karl and Marcella -Medina, and many of the plants for sale come from these gardens, ensuring they will grow well in our own local gardens. A plant list is compiled and circulated a week before the sale, please do bring it with you, it will help you find what you need. There will be a team of experts to advise at the sale, and a 'plant taxi' service to carry your purchases to your car.

- 49 Dahlias, Pompom, 1 vase, 3 blooms, flowers fully double, almost round in shape with tightly quilled petals. Flower size not to exceed 52mm in diameter.
- 50 Dahlias, Miniature, 1 vase, 3 blooms, may be mixed
- 51 Show Dahlias, 3 vases, 1 bloom in each
- 52 Dahlias, single flowered, vase of 3 stems of 1 cultivar

# POT PLANTS

# Hummingbird Cake

Originates from Jamaica where the hummingbird is the national bird! For best flavour, make the cake the day before eating


Ingredients: 180grams of granulated sugar 180grams light brown sugar 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon 1 teaspoon baking soda 3 large eggs 360grams of all purpose flour 200grams vegetable oil 2 teaspoons vanilla extract 180grams fresh pineapple – crushed (use a potato masher or fork) 4 large bananas (roasted in skins for 12 mins, cooled and mashed) 100grams pecans – chopped Cream cheese frosting of your choice

Preheat oven to Gas Mark 3/ 170/ 325f Roast the bananas – they may leak!

Butter 2 or 3 baking pans and line the base with parchment

Combine and sift flour, cinnamon, baking soda and salt Whisk eggs, sugars, oil and vanilla until smooth Fold in the flour mixture Crush the pineapple and add juice and fruit to the batter Mash the roasted bananas and add to the batter Finally add the pecans – do not over-mix Divide between the baking pans and bake for 25-30 minutes

Allow to cool in the pans for 5 minutes, then turn onto a wire rack Assemble and frost This cake keeps for 5 days in an airtight tin in the fridge Serve at room temperature

# The North Dublin Horticultural Societies Association NDHSA

The **'Exhibitor of the Year'** Perpetual Trophies/Prizes will be competed for at The North Dublin Horticultural Societies Association Annual Summer and Autumn Shows

There are two categories for Exhibitor of the Year Competition: (a)Fruit & Vegetables (b) Cut Flowers & Pot Plants.

The names of the exhibitors obtaining the highest aggregate of points in the Open Horticultural Classes in each of the two categories (a) and (b) above at each show will be forwarded to the Association for inclusion in this competition. Points will be determined on the basis of 3,2,1 for 1st, 2nd & 3rd respectively in all individual classes. Exhibitors may exhibit at any number of shows but only their top 6 highest points will count. Results will be recorded and distributed after each show and awards will be presented at the End of Season Show, date in October to be confirmed.
